Arto Paasilinna is perhaps the most renowned contemporary Finnish writer, having published 35 novels and countless other works over a career spanning 50 years. His most famous books include *The Year of the Hare, The Howling Miller, A Charming Mass Suicide,* and *The Forest of Hanged Foxes.* Paasilinna's books have sold over 8 million copies worldwide and have been translated extensively into over 40 languages.

Paasilinna's depictions of the endless escapades of Finns and their irrepressible attitude towards life have claimed a permanent place in Finland's literary canon. His tragi-comic stories about life in the North—along with his keen, satirical depictions of Finnish society—have captured the imaginations of millions of readers around the world. Often delving into magical realism, Paasilinna is sometimes described as an ecophilosopher; his works are simultaneously timely and timeless.

Exploring issues such as suicide, ageing, desperation, and everyday dreariness, Paasilinna paints a hilarious and joyful picture of the human race. At the core of his wild adventures lies a philosophical understanding of people as prisoners of modern conventions, mediocrity, and the other scourges of modern life—which his protagonists pig-headedly fight against.

Works by Paasilinna have been adapted to film and stage, both in Finland and abroad, and also as graphic novels.



The Year of the Hare

An internationally bestselling comic novel in which a man—with the help of a hare—realises what's important in life.

Journalist Vatanen is burnt out and sick of the city. One summer evening he accidently hits a young hare on a country road. He tends to the hare's leg, befriends the creature, and gradually sheds his former life.

The incident becomes a life-changing experience for Vatanen, who decides to quit his job, leave his wife, and sell his possessions to travel Finland with his new-found friend. Their adventures lead them to forest fires, pagan sacrifices, and killer bears before they settle down in a cosy cabin in the wilds of Lapland.

THE YEAR OF THE HARE is a wildly entertaining mix of fable, farce, mid-life crisis, and travel book. It's a tale of freedom, commitment, and survival that has been charming readers around the world for decades.

With rights sold in over 30 territories, this award-winning book is widely considered Arto Paasilinna's best work and a Finnish literary classic.

THE YEAR OF THE HARE was adapted for film in France in 2006 (dir. Marc Rivière) and Finland in 1977 (dir. Risto Jarva). It has also been adapted for stage. The UNESCO Collection of Representative Works classified it as a masterpiece of world literature.



The Forest of Hanged Foxes

Dark, macabre humour from Arto Paasilinna, the much-loved Kurt Vonnegut of the North.

"Only wealthy people lived in the old, respectable stone houses in Stockholm's Humlegaard; people like the Finn Oiva Juntunen. By profession, he was a crook."

Although they're locked up in prison, the crooks remain unusually calm, comforted by the knowledge that their friend is keeping their gold safe and will share it with them upon their release.

The problem is that Oiva Juntunen fancies the gold for himself. He becomes increasingly anxious as his friends' release day approaches. Faced with the prospect of two tough guys coming to collect their dues, Juntunen decides to make a run for it.

Filled with dark, macabre humour, Paasilinna seamlessly combines an action-packed narrative with strong characters and humorous, yet deep, philosophical musings in this situational comedy.

Mika Waltari is the most popular 20th century Finnish writer, best known for his magnus opus *The Egyptian*. Set in Egypt during the 18th Dynasty in 1300BC and first published in 1945, the historical novel became an immediate international bestseller upon publication and was adapted into a lavishly-produced Hollywood production by 20th Century Fox in 1954. It remains the most translated Finnish book in history.


Over a career that spanned five decades, Waltari published well over 100 works, which have been translated into over 40 languages to date.

As well as historical fiction, Waltari published crime fiction, poems, short stories, essays, fairy tales, travelogues, plays, and memoirs. In fact, Waltari is widely considered the first notable Finnish crime writer: his *Inspector Palmu* series is internationally-renowned and was adapted for film by Matti Kassila.

As a twenty-year-old Waltari became one of the lead figures of the Torchbearers, a Finnish literary movement who were inspired by Russian and Italian futurism and sought to take Finnish literature into the rest of Europe.

In 1957 he was appointed to the Academy of Finland, having previously won the state literature award a staggering five times.

Often drawing comparisons to Paul Morand, Ernest Hemingway, and F. Scott Fitzgerald, Waltari is credited with opening Finland's window towards continental Europe and introducing urban romanticism into Finnish literature.

Väinö Linna

1920-1992



Väinö Linna is one of the most influential Finnish authors of the 20th century. He was born in Urjala, Finland in 1920 into a family of tenant farmers, the seventh of ten children. Conscripted during the Second World War, Linna served as a machine-gunner on the eastern front from 1941-44, an experience that would form the basis for his breakthrough novel *The Unknown Soldier*, which caused a sensation by shattering the myth of the noble, obedient Finnish soldier.

The Unknown Soldier has been adapted for film three times, by Edvin Laine in 1955, Rauni Mollberg in 1985, and Aku Louhimies in 2017. The 1955 adaptation is shown on national television in Finland every Independence Day and watched by 20 per cent of Finns.

Linna is also the author of the *Under the North Star* trilogy, which follows the lives of an ordinary Finnish family through the First World War, the Finnish Civil War, and the Continuation War as well as the struggle between the Whites and the Reds in the movement to Independence. The trilogy is considered a classic in Finland, playing a crucial role in starting discussions about what really happened in 1918 and thus starting to heal decades-old wounds between the two factions.

Linna's works have had a profound influence on Finnish social, political, and cultural life. Their exuberant humour and earthy dialogue renewed the language of Finnish literature and many of their witticisms and sayings have found their way into collections of set phrases.

Väinö Linna's magnus opus follows an ordinary Finnish family living through the most turbulent period in Finland's history.

Part I, *Under the North Star*, is set in the decade preceding the February Manifesto and the eve of the First World War. We follow Jussi, a farm hand from Häme, as tension mounts between crofters and land owners and Jussi's son Askeli becomes an active socialist.

In Part II, the Finnish Civil War breaks out, with a trocities being committed on both sides.

The trilogy ends with Part III, which is set during the era of Finnish Independence. After the Finnish Civil War, life improves for farmers, but things take a turn for the worse when the Second World War breaks out.

Linna deftly wields the most powerful weapons in his literary arsenal from beginning to end: dark humour; characters that grow increasingly complex; and dialogue directly from the mouths of the nation's people. The *Under the North Star* trilogy is considered a work of art, which reveals more about the lives of Finns than history books themselves.
