A fresh and insightful exploration of what home is, how often we overlook it, and how sometimes—rarely— another person can be the home we've been looking for.


Flora, a young woman in her twenties, moves to Finland to be with her new boyfriend. Her old life in Latin America is on the other side of the ocean and, at the other end of their weekly video calls, her parents and the life and world she left behind.

As her new life in Helsinki begins to take shape: the search for work, new friends, and learning a whole new language in a city where there's a hair salon on every street corner and its people seemingly all the same, ubiquitous Marimekko tote bag on their shoulders.

Following Flora's first two years in her new life, the novel is narrated by her newfound friends and her father from their points-of-view, thereby not showing her experience through her own eyes, but through the eyes of those closest to her.

Inviting the reader to observe Flora's acculturation from the multiple viewpoints of her boyfriend, her father, both her boyfriend's mother and ex, and Flora's colleague the narrators also open themselves up to their own vulnerabilities and insecurities. Gradually, an intimate, prismatic portrait of a young, hopeful person emerges, along with an invitation to examine how we in turn perceive Flora through our own definitions of love, friendship, and sense of belonging.

Loís Armas offers up a refreshing narrative of an underrepresented perspective in contemporary Finnish literature that, thematically, brings to Tommy Orange's *There*, *There* or Zeshan Shakar's *They Call Me the Wolf* and, structurally, Laila Lalami's *The Other Americans*.

Chernobyl's Dogs

A documentary-style graphic novel about the 1986 Chernobyl nuclear disaster told from the perspective of the dogs who were left behind.

The Chernobyl nuclear power plant disaster in April 1986 remains to this day the most disastrous nuclear accident in history. When Pripyat and other surrounding villages were abandoned, after the mass evacuations that began two days after the reactor's meltdown, evacuees were ordered to leave their pets behind. Howling dogs tried to follow their owners, even trying to board buses only to be kicked off them by soldiers. Still, the dogs ran after the buses transporting their owners to safety. There was no mercy; Soviet troops were sent in to shoot the animals but some survived and their descendants still populate the polluted Exclusion Zone today. In this touching and still hauntingly relevant documentary-style graphic novel, which had just gone to print when Russia invaded Ukraine, Johanna Aulén recounts the events of the nuclear disaster and its devastating impact on the environment and its abandoned canine inhabitants, highlighting the resilience of those left behind.


During the ongoing war, Russian troops have jeopardized the safety of the Exclusion Zone and raised the spectre of the Chernobyl disaster in their occupation of Zaporizhzhia nuclear power plant, the largest nuclear power station in Europe. THE DOGS OF CHERNOBYL highlights the Soviet leaders' mistakes and disregard for human life thirty-six years ago that remain chillingly manifest to this day.

Johanna Aulén has donated non-exclusive NA English e-book rights to the graphic novel to the Clean Futures Fund (CFF), a non-profit that works to provide long-term support for communities affected by industrial accidents. All proceeds from sales of the Kindle edition go towards CFF's aid projects in Ukraine, where they have worked for several years with the Ukrainian government in assisting people and animals still affected by the Chernobyl disaster. CFF provides sterilization, vaccinations and medical care, as well as food for the stray dogs in the Chernobyl Exclusion Zone.

Lt. Riina Koivu returns in a nail-biting new thriller set in the frozen wastes of Finnish Lapland and Svalbard as Russia seeks to secure its northern hegemony that demands Finland must once again fight fire with fire.

His debut collection of short stories, *The Madman of Freedom Square* (2009), was longlisted for the Independent Foreign Fiction Prize in 2010. His second collection, *The Iraqi Christ* (2013), won the Independent Foreign Fiction Prize in 2014. His debut novel, *Allah99* was published in 2020 to international critical acclaim. Blasim's writing has been translated into over 20 languages to date.





Book 4, **SHAMED** (*Häväistyt*) hits close to home for Detective Linda

Toivonen, who is assigned the case of a missing schoolgirl that leads to
a shady online predator calling themselves 'Peter Pan' as Linda also

does battle with her own, personal demons.

Set in and around the Baltic coastal city of Pori in south-west Finland, Tuominen's series has been praised for its atmospheric setting and socially-engaged, distinctive narratives that give a compassionate and relatable voice to those on both sides of the law. Yours, Margot

Over time, Vilja's memories of her childhood dissolve, much like the country itself.

In 2011, after her father's death, Vilja finds a bundle of letters addressed to 'Erich' from someone in Berlin called 'Margot', with whom her father evidently had had a passionate relationship with. Vilja decides to try and track down this Margot and returns to Berlin. The transformed city still bears some memories for her but the most important pieces seem to be missing. Her search for Margot, rips open everything she thought she knew about her parents and her childhood.

With a propulsive narrative and rich detail that immerses the reader into the East Berlin before 'die Wende', this is an accomplished, suspenseful European novel that evokes stylistic comparisons to both lan McEwan and Sarah Waters by a gifted storyteller from the Nordics who truly captures the essence of why we should read at all.




